

## Workshop review by Nancy Grable

In September, the St. Louis Calligraphy Guild sponsored two workshops with Laurie Doctor, back to back over the course of four days. Laurie's reputation as a teacher of fun, free-spirited classes had me excited about the opportunity to spend four days learning new techniques and creating a variety of unique calligraphic pieces.

The first workshop was titled Casual Capitals and Color. This class would use different tools and materials with some unique typestyles. Laurie described her "rules" to follow in class: keep your hand moving, stay in contact with the paper, write words. One thing to remember is to "follow your muse", or, your inner voice. "Lean into your destiny" - your destiny is making choices to do the most of what is given to you. Class time is meant to be free of distractions, as this is your time to be creative.

Our classes began with some stretching, flexibility movements to loosen the muscles. Laurie then quoted some of the poetry she offered for use in the writing exercises. We were given several to choose from and most of us found one or two that spoke to us. Each day started with music and "writing, writing, writing".

Most of the type styles used were variations of Laurie's free-written capitals with pointed pen. We used a variety of tools: shells, edges of popsicle sticks, embossing/burnishing tools, in addition to the usual pencils, pen nibs and gel pens. We wrote with walnut ink, sumi ink, white gouache - some full strength, some watered down, some mixed together and lettered on top of one another. The type styles were lettered in different sizes, sometimes overlapping and almost illegible. Often, we might go back over the letters to shade, with plain water or another color or maybe colored pencils. Or, we might just write over the lettering with another color in another style and size. This was time for experimentation and free play!


Laurie's best recommendation is to "just write every day"! Keep a paper ready, one with boxes drawn and

even if you don't have a lot of time, just letter in a box every day. We practiced on black Arches cover paper and cream Arches text wove paper. Pages were divided into six boxes, any size and pattern. Different type styles, tools and materials were used in each box.

In this class, we created a book of the Arches text wove paper and a case for the book out of the black Arches cover paper. The book case was created like a box with foldover flap that some chose to tie closed with ribbon and beads. The book inside was a compilation of the various type styles and techniques so we could remember what we had practiced in the class. Some of us thought the book cases looked like cute little clutch purses!

The second workshop was titled The Poetry of Handwriting. After two days of freedom with color and tools and type, we began to experiment with our personal handwriting styles, changing letter shapes and forms to develop and enhance our handwriting. This was much harder than expected...most of us don't change our handwriting after it is learned. But, it was a fun opportunity to try experiment with looks. For example, I made different "fs" and "ys", to find a pleasing change from my present shapes.

This class project was to create a large abstract painting derived from letter forms. We started with large overlapping lettering using sumi ink. Then, we used an open square "window" to find an interesting composition which was reproduced at four times larger. On Arches text wove paper, we used sumi ink to create the letterform strokes. Then the negative space was painted with walnut ink and diluted sumi ink, leaving a white space around the strokes. One option was to continue to enlarge the composition and leave out some of the strokes for more abstractness of designs. Laurie shared with us her beautiful series of designs created using this process.



In all, these two classes were creatively challenging and so much fun with Laurie and our classmates. It was a luxury to spend four days with friends, learning and creating and laughing! I look forward to another class with Laurie Doctor in the future.

An exhibit of Mrs. Cady's art and calligraphy, as well as some of the pages from the book, will be on display at our ArtSpace at least through our January meeting. 
Lanore Cady (known as Skip to her friends), is originally from Owensburg, Indiana. She began her art

education at the University of Indiana at Bloomington, then joined the 1st Contingent of Navy Waves, and moved to Arcada, California after WWII with her husband James. She received her degree from Humboldt State College in art and studied calligraphy under Reese Bullen. She was influenced by Father Edward Catich who became a lifelong friend. She was also a colleague of Raymond DaBoll, Lloyd Reynolds, Heather Childs and James Lewis, many familiar names in the calligraphic community. She taught calligraphy at Humboldt.

In 1977 Lanore wrote the book, *Houses & Letters*, which instigated the renovation and restoration of older Victorian houses in Arcada. With her book, *Houses & Letters*, she widened the scope of interest in calligraphy that had been sweeping across the country. Lanore and six other women (the Gypsy Painters) were commissioned to do many paintings for the White House store during the Bicentennial. She has also had many successful exhibits throughout her long career.

Lanore retired back to Scotland, Indiana where she worked and taught out of her Brick Star Studio. She still lives there with her two sons. In 2001 she was awarded the Alumni of the Year by Humboldt College.

We are grateful to Tracey Cady for sharing these works of art, done by her former mother-in-law, with the Guild so that we may enjoy and be inspired by them too.



# Charles Pearce Workshop

## Pen Manipulation Techniques

March 13 & 14, 2010, 9:00am to 4:30 pm

Along with this important pen manipulation technique, Charles introduces some fun and funky alphabets. Great for all skill levels. A description of the class from Charles Pearce's website, [www.whiskeyspring.com](http://www.whiskeyspring.com):

*Edward Johnston once gave a lecture, wherein he wrote on a blackboard with the side of a piece of chalk for a full fifty-five minutes. He then turned to the assembled students and said: "Ladies and gentlemen, the angle of the pen remains constant. Good morning". And left! However, later on, one of his students, Irene Wellington, noticed that EJ's pen did, in fact, change angle and made some remark to that effect. Unfazed, Johnston said: "Sleight of hand, my dear, sleight of hand"!*

*Much later, Arthur Baker developed his own approach to pen manipulation which has given us, as calligraphers a totally new outlook on our art. While some of Mr. Baker's letters are not too practical for general writing purposes, the techniques that he has espoused open up whole new avenues for us to experiment with.*

*During this workshop we shall look at how to achieve these different effects in our writing; how we must change our body positions and even the positions of the pens in our hands, in order to make these different letters. There will be plenty of demonstration of different alphabets with one-on-one instruction.*
